2020 Delaware Crossing Picnic, Memorial Service and Flag Retirement

On September 18, the Delaware Crossing Chapter Picnic was attended by 29 people. William Edward Herrman was inducted into the SAR via the Delaware Crossing Chapter at the picnic.

William Edward Herrman's Patriot ancestor was Peter Brown who was a 2nd Lt. Col in John H. Stone's Co, 1st Maryland Regiment. He also took the Oath of Allegiance in Washington County, Tennessee in 1778 to make a land entry.

Following the picnic, a Memorial Service was conducted for 8 compatriots whose deaths had been reported in the past year from the Delaware Crossing and Monticello Chapters. The service was conducted by Chaplain Bruce Smith with assistance of Bill Herrman ringing the bell and Lisa Rush playing Taps.

Past (inactive) members of Delaware Crossing Chapter were Philip Kent Kelso, James Gaylord Crowley, Elmer Allison Weir, and William Phillip Morgan. Inactive member from Monticello Chapter was Keith Quentin Hays, III. Members current at time of death were John D. Bouck, Jr., John "Jack" Mahan Brooks and Sheldon Maurice Crossette.

Immediately following the Memorial Service, a Flag Retirement Ceremony Conducted by President Ken Ludwig, CG Commander Steve French, Dan Dryer and Color Guardsman Gavin Kurtz.

The Color Guard for both ceremonies consisted of Commander Steve French, Alan Martin of MC, Dewey Fry and Gavin Kurtz of DX.

The food prepared by Dewey and Pat Fry was extraordinary and numerous compliments were given by the members at the picnic. Many favorable comments from DAR attendees of the Memorial Service and Flag Retirement Ceremony were received by Dewey during and for a few days following the events.
